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Scholarships Available

North West REC and Basin Electric Power Cooperative will be sponsoring several scholarships to dependents of members of North West REC in 2024. Last year we awarded \$33,000 in scholarships to 75 students!

There will be two \$1,000 scholarship winners from each of the four districts of North West REC (Ida, O'Brien, Plymouth, and Sioux). The selection process for the \$1,000 scholarship winners will be based on a combination of SAT/ACT scores, overall grade-point average, work experience, participation in school and community activities, a personal statement of career goals, and a written reference or appraisal by a third party.

Scholarship applicants, who are not awarded a \$1,000 scholarship award, will be asked to watch an educational video on North West REC and the cooperative model and then complete a questionnaire. This will then enter applicants into a random drawing for a \$500 or \$250 scholarship. All applicants will receive at least a \$250 scholarship. Details of this video and questionnaire will be communicated at a later date.

North West REC members may qualify if their dependent meets the following criteria:

- Must be a U.S. citizen.
- Are current North West REC members.
- Must be a senior in high school in our service territory for the 2023-2024 school year and planning to enroll in a full-time undergraduate or graduate course of study at an accredited two-year or four-year college, university, or vocational/ technical school.
- Submit an application as provided by North West REC.
- Return all completed forms no later than Friday, February 16, 2024.

North West REC will send two high school juniors on an all-expenses paid Youth Tour trip to Washington, D.C. on June 15-21, 2024!

At North West REC one way we invest in the next generation of rural lowa leaders is by participating in the national Electric Cooperative Youth Tour program. We're looking for high school junior students with a passion for government and public service to apply for a once-in-a-lifetime trip to our nation's capital in June.

Two students will be selected from eligible candidates to attend the 2024 Youth Tour in Washington, D.C., from June 16-21, with orientation June 15th in Des Moines, along with 40 other student leaders from Iowa. The Iowa Youth Tour group will join with hundreds of students from across the country as they learn more about electric cooperatives and American history and come home with a greater understanding of their role as an American citizen. Students will also learn about U.S. government and meet with their members of Congress. On the trip, students take in the sights of D.C. as they visit monuments, museums, and historical landmarks. Students who go on Youth Tour often call it the trip of a lifetime!

We are accepting Youth Tour applications now through February 16, 2024. Dependants of North West REC member-consumers are eligible to apply. The student must currently be a junior in high school. 

MANAGER'S Report

Board Approves 2024 Operating Budget - Base Electric Rates to Remain Stable

As part of our planning process each year, a detailed operating budget is prepared and reviewed with the board of directors. This budget includes detailed projections on kilowatt-hour (kWh) sales, revenues, expenses, margin levels and financial ratios. The following is a summary of some of the highlights of the 2024 operating budget:

2024 Operating Budget Highlights



The good news is that following the review of the Operating Budget, the board of directors decided to keep our base electric rates the same again in 2024. As of June 1 of this year, we will be reaching a nine-year period of rate stability.

There will be a slight change in the power cost adjustment (PCA) in 2024. As a reminder, the PCA is a method of either collecting from or returning to the members the difference in wholesale power costs compared to the base wholesale rate that was used to establish the current electric rate. The PCA was a credit of 1 mill (1/10 of a cent) in 2023 due to the fact that we were passing along \$700,000 in bill credits we had received from our power supplier the previous year. The PCA for 2024 will be 1 mill instead of a credit 1 mill. This is due to the fact that our wholesale purchased power costs, which account for 78% of our total operating expenses, are going up 2024.

We are pleased that we have been able to keep our base electric rates stable for 9 years, especially when you consider how high inflation has been in recent years and how much most other things that our members purchase have gone up. This has been accomplished through increasing kWh sales, relatively stable wholesale purchased power costs, and efficiencies we continue to realize from our previous consolidations.

Galloping power lines

How can galloping lines impact power transmission and distribution? Galloping power lines are typically caused when ice and high winds occur at the same time. Freezing rain creates icicles and odd-shaped ice formations on power lines and conductors. The ice buildup changes how wind and air impact the now misshapen, ice-covered line. This change in airflow can cause the power line to start to bounce.

Once the lines get going, they can bounce and buck enough to hit another line, damage themselves enough to cause a power outage or even fall to the ground.

There is not much a power company can do to alleviate galloping lines since the wild motion is caused by Mother Nature. To help prevent this, many power lines have special mechanisms, such as twisted wire or round or angular pieces of metal, attached to the line. While they can help, sometimes they are no match for severe ice and wind.

Aside from ice storms, year-round storms can cause damaging winds, which can knock down power lines and blow trees and limbs onto power lines. Keep the following safety tips in mind:

- When you see power lines on the ground, stay away, warn others to stay away and contact the electric utility or 911. Lines do not have to be arcing or sparking to be live.
- Any utility wire, including telephone or cable lines that are sagging or down, could be in contact with an energized power line, also making it dangerous. Do not try to guess the types of lines —stay away from all lines.
- Be alert to the possibility that tree limbs or debris may hide electrical hazards. Downed power lines can energize objects around them, such as chain-link fences and metal culverts.
- Keep in mind that a dead line could become energized during power restoration efforts or improper use of generators.
- Never drive over a downed line. It could start a chain reaction and cause additional poles or other equipment to collapse.
- If you are in a car that has contacted or is near a downed power line, stay in your vehicle. Wait until the utility crew has arrived and de-energized the line. Warn others not to approach the car.
- Only exit a car or cab near or on downed lines if there
 is a fire. If this happens, cross your arms over your chest
 and make a solid jump out and away from the car with
 both feet together. Then hop away at least 50 feet or
 more while continuing to keep both feet together.

ICE ON POWER LINES IS A WEIGHTY SUBJECT



When it comes to getting electricity across power lines and into homes, ice can be a force to be reckoned with.

ICE ON DISTRIBUTION LINES

Ice can quickly lead to broken power poles and other pole equipment. Ice can also make falling tree branches 30x heavier and much more likely to break power lines.

ON A 300-FOOT SPAN OF 1-INCH-THICK POWER LINES

- 1/2 inch of ice adds 281 pounds of weight
- 1 inch of ice adds 749 pounds of weight
- 2 inches of ice adds 2,248 pounds of weight

WHEN ICE MELTS

Melting ice can cause power outages. If ice on the bottom (neutral) line melts before the lines above, it can cause the lines to touch.

OTHER ICE FACTS

- Damage can begin when ice exceeds 1/4 of an inch
- 1/2 inch of ice can cause a line to sag up to 12 inches
- Pressure can also be caused by a broken tree limb
- Both ice and melting ice can cause power outages


Statewide Outage Map

Information about power outages effecting homes, businesses and farms served by North West REC is available online at www.iowarec.org, the website of the Iowa Association of Electric Cooperatives.

This web resource, developed by the Iowa Association of Electric Cooperatives, provides a statewide view of power outages at electric cooperatives that deliver electricity in each of the state's 99 counties to approximately

650,000 lowans. When you log onto the power outage tool, you will see a map of lowa, and you can view the information from a county-by-county view of lowa or electric co-op-by-electric co-op view, including North West REC. At the website, you also will be able to obtain safety information as well as link to North West REC. In addition to going to the statewide association's website to view the maps, you can check out the information at http://outages.iowarec.org.

When there are widespread power outages in Iowa or isolated power outages impacting large numbers of Iowans, North West REC will enter information onto the website. The map will automatically refresh every 15 minutes, so it will reflect the most recently entered information from the electric co-ops. When only a few North West REC member-consumers are without power, the website may not necessarily reflect that information.


