

ELECTRIC CO-OPS ADVOCATE FOR RURAL IOWA DURING

REC Day on the Hill

More than 200 employees and directors, representing 36 of Iowa's rural electric cooperatives (RECs), traveled to the Iowa State Capitol on March 20 to advocate for important issues during our annual "REC Day on the Hill" event. The cooperative advocates were briefed on state and federal legislative issues by the Iowa Association of Electric Cooperatives (IAEC) before meeting with local legislators during a dessert social in the Capitol.

This annual visit to the Iowa Capitol is an excellent opportunity to personally visit with our elected officials and provide them with a co-op perspective on issues that are important to rural Iowa and rural economic development.

Advocates educated legislators on the benefits of the cooperative business model, including local ownership, cost-based rates and democratic governance. Legislators also learned about three priorities important to lowa's electric cooperatives:

- Ensuring safety and reliability of service through vegetation management
- Supporting cost-effective energy efficiency programs for homes and farms
- Responsible power generation and delivery through fair treatment of all member-owners and utilization of advanced technology

Many electric cooperatives also displayed booths in the rotunda which provided information on topics including energy efficiency programs, rural broadband efforts, investments in technology and rural economic development.

lowa's rural electric cooperatives and municipal utilities commitment goes far beyond ensuring safe, reliable, affordable and environmentally responsible energy. They actively create strategic partnerships and provide technical and financial assistance to support growth and community vitality. Annually, lowa Area Development Group (IADG) presents Impact Awards to utility partners who are involved in significant economic development initiatives the prior year.

At Northwest Iowa Power Cooperative's annual meeting in Sioux City, North West REC was recognized for their extraordinary economic development accomplishments and commitment to the community.

North West REC was presented with an IADG Impact Award for project development. Recent examples of project support took place in Rock Valley. The first is the new \$5.5 million GrandStay Hotel which will soon open in the Rock Ridge Business Park. North West REC supported a hotel feasibility study, rebates and an electric car charging station. The second project is the new River View Ridge Senior Living complex. North West REC provided a loan from their Revolving Loan Fund, as well as rebates for a geothermal system and lighting. North West REC also provides electric power to these facilities.

"We commend North West REC for their strong leadership and support of business and community development," said IADG President, Rand Fisher. "They provide important technical and financial assistance that many times is a key component in successfully securing projects that create jobs and support community vitality."

The Iowa Area Development Group is the marketing and business development office for Iowa's member-owned rural electric cooperatives, select municipal electric utilities and independent telecommunication companies. IADG has assisted with over 2,100 successful business expansions and start-up projects. This growth represents capital investment of more than \$12 billion and 53,000 jobs for Iowa. BOARD ROOM SUMMARY

The following is a brief summary of the discussions and decisions from the March board meeting:

- During the reorganization portion of the meeting, the following were elected as officers:
 - o Jeff Rehder, President
 - o Doug Becker, Vice President
 - o Shirley Benson, Secretary
 - o Tom Wagner, Treasurer
 - o Steve Brown, Assistant Secretary-Treasurer
 - o Lyle Korver, Chief Executive Officer
- Received monthly safety, operations and financial reports from staff.
- Received and accepted the annual CPA audit report as presented by Derrick Larson from Eide Bailly.
- Heard a report about the recent challenges we faced with the flooding conditions. There were 19 broken poles and other damages that caused outages.
- kWh sales were at a record level for the month of February and also for the first two months of the year. Sales are up 2.5% for the year-to-date.
- The patronage assignment of 2018 margins were approved for a record \$5,850,000.
- Manager Korver reported on several economic development projects that are nearing completion or are underway.
- Approved membership applications for 18 new members.
- The board approved the acceptance of low bids for a new truck that was included in the capital outlay budget.
- A report was shared on the status of the load management trial project that will be starting in April.
- A ten-year contract for service was approved for the new Sioux County Nature Center project.
- Heard reports from Director Tom Wagner on the recent NIPCO and Basin Board Meetings.
- Heard a report from Director Rehder on the recent NRECA and CFC Annual Meetings.
- An update was shared on the REC Day on the Hill that was held at the State Capitol in March.
- Approved recommendations from the Operations Round Up Committee on \$4,800 in contributions to charities or families who have experienced medical or emergency hardships.



Prairie Winds PROGRAM UPDATE

Members of North West REC can support renewable energy through the Prairie Winds program. This program allows individual members to voluntarily contribute to the development of alternate energy production facilities.



Persons who choose to participate in Prairie Winds will pay 20 cents per 100 kilowatt-hour block per month. This is reduced from 50 cents in 2010.

Through this program, members will not be directly purchasing alternate energy, but the extra fee does go to support several wind turbines in the Dakotas, which feed wind-generated electricity into the transmission system that powers North West REC.

REVOLVING LOAN FUND

North West REC created the Community/Economic Development Revolving Loan Fund (RLF) to improve the quality of life in rural areas by contributing to long term improvement in the local economy.

The RLF is a local funding source with a goal of providing low interest loans to assist local economic and community development projects. Our priorities include job creation and retention, diversification of the local economy, improving the skills of the rural workforce, and upgrading the public infrastructure to improve the health, safety, and/or medical care of rural residents. This fund is administered by the North West REC Board of Directors.

Eligible applicants include organizations involved in community or economic development projects such as: new or expanding private business, local governments and nonprofit community development organizations.


