

Making "Cents" Out of Tax Reform Policies

Tax policy can be complicated. If you've ever done your own federal and state income taxes or if you own a business, you understand firsthand how every detail matters in compliance, especially when it comes to profits.

Because North West REC is a not-for-profit business entity there is sometimes confusion about whether we pay taxes. The answer is: yes, we pay taxes. We pay property taxes, employee taxes, replacement taxes, and taxes on materials and supplies to name a few. However, we don't pay taxes on business profits, because we are not a profit-based organization.

Because electric cooperatives are not-for-profit organizations – operating at cost to deliver affordable and reliable power across all of lowa's 99 counties – we don't have operating profits. Since our rates are based on the cost of acquiring and delivering electricity, we don't make money on the services we provide. If we receive a cost reduction from our suppliers, those savings are passed along to our member-owners. If we have excess funds – commonly called margins – from providing our member-owners with safe, reliable, affordable and environmentally responsible electricity, we return those funds to you in the form of deferred patronage dividends. Since our inception, operating at cost has been a cornerstone of the cooperative business model.


Taxes on profits are in the news. You may have heard or read that the tax reform bill is now law, meaning that as of January 1 the corporate tax rate dropped to

21 percent. This is good news for many businesses. Lawmakers suggested the extra profits – once paid to the federal government in the form of taxes – could now be used for improving products, lowering prices and generally boosting the economy. However, some critics of the new law argue that the extra money will line the pockets of shareholders.

Commissions across the country are looking at what this means for various types of profit-making corporations, some of which are utilities. Like other regulatory bodies across the country, the Iowa Utilities Board has opened an investigation into how the new federal tax reform bill might impact Iowa's customers, and if the result would change Iowans' energy rates.

Because electric cooperatives aren't profit-making corporations, the new tax bill does not change our tax status. We won't pay any more or any less in taxes based on the electricity we are distributing to our members.

Taxes come in many forms and are an important part of a thriving economy.
Each year, lowa's electric cooperatives pay \$14 million in property taxes.
Since the late 1980s, the lowa Area



Development Group has assisted 2,000 companies in investing more than \$10 billion in new business locations and expansions. Those efforts have led to Iowa's electric cooperatives creating or retaining more than 50,000 taxpaying jobs in rural Iowa.

Annual District Meetings Scheduled

One of the most important things we do each year is to have annual district meetings. This gives us the opportunity to engage with our members and to share information about the Cooperative's operations. Once again, we are having four meetings – one in each district – and the last one is our official Annual Meeting. We serve a meal, have a short business/information meeting and then have entertainment that we hope appeals to all

age groups. We are excited to have former Iowa Hawkeye football quarterback, Chuck Long, as a speaker at our District 1 and 2 meetings this year and Gary Tyson, magician and musician, at our District 3 and 4 meetings.

NORTH WEST REC OFFERS POWERLINE Scholarships

North West REC is again sponsoring a powerline scholarship. This program is designed to assist persons enrolled in a course of powerline training at Northwest lowa Community College in Sheldon.

A \$500 scholarship will be awarded to an individual who has met the eligibility requirements. To be considered for the scholarship, applicants must meet the following criteria:

- Reside in the four county area served by North West REC (Ida, Plymouth, O'Brien and Sioux Counties)
- Be a member or the child of a member of North West REC
- Be accepted as a full time student in the powerline program at Northwest Iowa Community College in Sheldon
- File a scholarship application with North West REC by Friday, March 30, 2018

All applicants are required to submit an application form as well as their most recent academic transcript. The criteria for the award will be based upon community and school activities, potential for success and grade point average.

A check will be made out to both the recipient and Northwest Iowa Community College and will be sent to the recipient prior to the beginning of the second semester of course work.

Want to visit Washington, D.C.? Who wouldn't? It's FUN, it's FREE and you'll make lots of FRIENDS!





- All other business that may come before the meeting or any adjournments thereof.


