

MANAGER'S Report

Recap of Record Setting Year in 2024

As we prepare for our Annual Meeting on March 25, we wanted to share a few highlights from 2024. Even as we continue to face many challenges and changes in our electric utility industry, we are pleased to report that your Cooperative had one of its best years ever in a couple of key areas of our operation. Here are a few highlights.

Reliability. Providing reliable electric service for our members is one of North West REC's (NWREC) highest priorities so it was exciting to see our year end reliability numbers and to realize that your Cooperative enjoyed it's best year ever. One of the key reliability ratios that we monitor closely is our System Average Interruption Index (SAIDI). This is a metric that measures the average amount of time a customer experiences an outage over a given period of time. It's a good way to measure the overall reliability of our electric system.



For the year 2024, the average NWREC member was out of power for only 45 minutes for the whole year. This was the lowest we have seen in the history of the Cooperative and is a great accomplishment for our employee team. We were able to provide reliability at a rate of 99.99%.

In the past, an average outage number of less than two hours was considered good in the industry. As NWREC and our power suppliers continue to make significant investments in system improvements, we have seen that number decrease and we will work for continued improvement in our overall reliability for our members.


Kilowatthour Sales. We also enjoyed a record year in terms of kilowatthour (kWh) sales. Your Cooperative has enjoyed a significant amount of growth over the last 25 years through our emphasis on economic development and the amount of value added ag and commercial and industrial growth in our service area. For example, the four ethanol plants that that we serve all came on-line within that time frame and now account for nearly 30% of our total sales.

kWh sales for 2024 were a record of 758 million. The increase over 2023's sales was 48 million kWh's or 6.7%. As you can see on the graph below, a majority of the sales growth is coming from our larger three phase

commercial, industrial and value added ag customers. Sales from these larger customers now accounts for 63% of total sales.

As we often report, increasing kWh sales is good for all of our members as we are able to spread our fixed costs over a higher level of sales. This has been one of the key factors that has enabled NWREC to enjoy a 10-year period of rate stability.

We are optimistic that NWREC will continue to grow. We have a very progressive service area with available lots for business and industry, as well has housing expansion.

The following is a brief summary of the discussions and decisions from the January board meeting:

- Doug Alons gave the safety report. He reported that 2024 was a safe year of operations with no lost time accidents or any public contact incidents.
- Manager Korver provided an update on service reliability, kWh sales, number of new services added in 2024, miles of line that were replaced, a new basket truck was delivered following a four year wait and an industry update.
- Curt Ahrenholz presented the year-to-date financial reports.
- Preliminary plans for the March Annual Meeting were reviewed and approved.
- Heard reports from Director Wagner on the recent NIPCO and Basin Board Meetings.

- Manager Korver provided an update on several economic development projects that are being worked on.
- Director Rehder gave a CFC Board Report.
- An update was provided on the status of load management and switch installations. Over 13,000 meters and 3,000 load management switches have been changed to the new RF "two way" system.
- Approved Operation Round-Up donations to several charitable organizations and medical emergency situations.
- Membership applications of new members were approved.

Pole Maintenance Program

You probably don't pay much attention to the utility poles found throughout North West REC's service territory, but did you know these tall structures are the backbone of our distribution network?

Strong, sturdy utility poles ensure a reliable electric system, which is why we routinely inspect the thousands of poles found on our lines. Throughout the year, our crews check poles for decay caused by exposure to the elements. They know which poles are oldest and conduct inspections through a rotational process. Typically, a standard wooden distribution pole is expected to last more than 50 years.

Occasionally, poles need to be replaced for other reasons besides decay and old age. Weather disasters, power line relocation, and car crashes are potential causes for immediate replacement. When possible, North West REC communicates when and where pole replacements will take place so that you stay informed of where crews will be working.

One of the key ongoing maintenance programs we do annually, in order to try to improve our service



reliability, is pole testing and treating. Each year we test and treat approximately 3,000 poles.

Poles that are rejected due to excessive rotting conditions are replaced. The other poles are treated with a pole treatment which significantly extends the life of the pole. The very low 2% or lower rejection rate we typically have each year is a strong indication of the strength of the Cooperative's system.


A frequently asked question we get when people sign up for Switch Makes Cents is "How SMART? much money will it save me?"

When you opt in to participate in the Switch Makes Cents load management program, you will have the benefit of avoiding demand costs as well as receiving a reduced energy rate just for opting-in to Switch Makes Cents. Visit our website www.nwrec.coop or call the office for all our current rates. Here are our current electric heat rates:

The Electric Heat Partial Control Rate is applicable for homes and buildings that have electric heat as their primary heat source without any backup heat source. The rate is \$.063 per KWh per month for all KWh sold for heating, cooling and water heater usage.

The Interruptible Electric Heat Rate is applicable for homes and buildings that have electric heat as their primary heat source and agree to have a load management switch installed. The rate is \$.049 per KWh per month for all KWh sold for heating, cooling and water heater usage.


