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Board Approves \$1.6 Million Patronage Retirement

As I am writing this article, I have been reflecting on how quickly things can change in our lives. During these challenging times, please know that your Cooperative continues to implement and carry out plans and procedures to help our members and employees deal with the impact of the COVID-19 outbreak.


We are pleased to announce to the members that the Board of Directors has approved an early retirement of deferred patronage dividends to our members in May. This would typically have been scheduled for December, but this was one way the Board and management felt that we could provide some assistance to our members as many of you face financial challenges relating to the COVID-19 situation.

A total of **\$1,638,000** in patronage will be retired.



How will the funds be distributed to the members?



It will be distributed as a bill credit on the electric bills dated May 20. (If a member was on the line during a portion of 2019 or 2018 and have since moved off of our line, they will receive a check for their share of the patronage retirement.)



What year of business will this be based on?



We will be using a Last In, First Out (LIFO) method, so it will be based on the amount of electricity each member purchased in 2019, with a small portion based on 2018. Historically we have used a First In, First Out method (FIFO). We are on a 12-year retirement cycle, so had we used the FIFO method, it would have been based on the 2008 allocation. We will likely go back to a FIFO method in the future, but due to the unusual circumstances at the current time, the Board believes this is a good change to provide some assistance to our current members.

Water Heater Warranty Explained

Many of our members have purchased Marathon water heaters from us. Here are a few warranty facts when purchasing the water heater for your home (residential):

- The tank has a lifetime warranty if owned by the original purchaser.
- The parts (elements, thermostats, valves) are under warranty for six years.

If you are not the original purchaser of the water heater and are uncertain of your warranty, please contact our office as there are different warranties depending on the year it was purchased.

If the tank does leak under warranty and you need a replacement, we will need the original silver sticker off the water heater to send to the company to receive the replacement unit.

- Marathon water heaters are sold only to our members and have to be installed on our lines.
- You must have a load management switch installed to receive the rebate.

The rebate is taken off the cost of the water heater – member cost:

50 gallon	\$550
85 gallon	\$400
105 gallon	\$550






MOVE OVER OR SLOW DOWN



COVID-19 Update (continued)

In light of the COVID-19 outbreak and to ensure the health and safety of our members and employees, we have taken the following steps in recent weeks:

- Our offices have been closed, with some of our office employees working from home on a rotating basis.
- We are encouraging members to use various payment options that are available instead of paying at the office – these include drop boxes at all of our facilities, mail, and on-line payment options.
- Our line crews have been split into two groups and have been working staggered start and ending times to maintain good social distancing practices.



- Our member service employees have been taking their work pickups home and working remotely.
- Our Board Meeting was held by Zoom video conference.
- Our District Meetings were cancelled and we held our Annual Meeting at our Le Mars Service Center with just a few Nominating/Inspectors of Election Committee members, directors and staff in attendance.
- We have taken many other preventative steps and are following the guidance from the President and Governor.
- Important note: During this time, we are still open for business, taking phone calls and our outage restoration time should be the same as it typically is.

Thank you for your understanding during these challenging times. We assure you that your co-op plans and prepares for disaster and emergency situations such as this, and we have a process in place to ensure that we can continue to provide reliable and safe electric service for our members.

We also want to assure our members that your Cooperative is financially strong and will be able to work through this difficult time without any immediate need to adjust rates.

ANNUAL MEETING REPORT

We held the Annual Meeting on the evening of Thursday, April 2 with attendance restricted to our Nominating/Inspectors of Election Committee members, a few directors and staff. Here are a few highlights:

- Scott Feuerhelm was re-elected to the District 3 board position.
- The proposed Amendment to the Articles of Incorporation that eliminates director term limits was approved with a 73.35% favorable vote of the members. 1,092 mail ballots were returned and there were 801 "yes" votes. In order to pass, it required 66-2/3%.
- President Rehder and Manager Korver reported on 2019's operations, gave a COVID-19 update, presented a governance update and a brief financial report. They reported that 2019 was a very successful year for NWREC and the Cooperative continues to be in a very strong financial position.


• It was announced that 63 students have been selected to receive college scholarships for the 2020/21 school year. The total amount of the scholarships awarded was a record \$27,250.

Prairie Winds PROGRAM UPDATE

Members of North West REC can support renewable energy through the Prairie Winds program. This program allows individual members to voluntarily contribute to the development of alternate energy production facilities.



Persons who choose to participate in Prairie Winds will pay 20 cents per 100 kilowatt-hour block per month.

Through this program, members will not be directly purchasing alternate energy, but the extra fee does go to support several wind turbines in the Dakotas, which feed wind-generated electricity into the transmission system that powers North West REC.

Revolving Loan Fund

North West REC created the Community/Economic Development Revolving Loan Fund (RLF) to improve the quality of life in rural areas by contributing to long term improvement in the local economy.

The RLF is a local funding source with a goal of providing low interest loans to assist local economic and community development projects. Our priorities include job creation and retention, diversification of the local economy, improving the skills of the rural workforce, and upgrading the public infrastructure to improve the health, safety, and/or medical care of rural residents. This fund is administered by the North West REC Board of Directors.

Eligible applicants include organizations involved in community or economic development projects such as: new or expanding private business, local governments and nonprofit community development organizations.


