2020 SCHOLARSHIP //inners

North West REC provides several scholarships to high school students each spring. These scholarships are funded by North West REC and Basin Electric Power Cooperative, a consumer-owned, regional generation and transmission (G&T) cooperative based in Bismarck, N.D., responsible for supplying wholesale electric power to eight Midwestern states.

The scholarship program is designed to recognize and encourage the academic achievement of students in the region; it is also an investment in the economic future of rural areas. This year North West REC awarded four \$1,000 scholarships, four \$750 scholarships, twenty-six \$500 scholarships, and thirty-one \$250 scholarships. The \$1,000 and \$750 scholarship winners were chosen through applications by our scholarship committee. The \$500 scholarship winners were randomly drawn and the remainder of those seniors who turned in an application and would have attended the annual meeting were awarded \$250 scholarship winners.

ficiency LOANS FOR HOMEOWNERS

An energy-efficiency loan from North West REC can be an effective way to improve your home and save energy.

The loan may be made for qualifying energy efficient home improvements such as new electric heating systems, an electric water heater, or energy efficient windows and doors.

If interested in an energy efficiency loan, members must complete a loan application and provide a complete itemized bill. This bill may include electric heat equipment, wiring, labor, electric water heater, and electric space conditioning equipment for cooling. Insulation expense, to improve the integrity of the building and the space to be conditioned, may be included in a loan. The loan application and credit check will be reviewed by the board of directors.

Other specifics of our loan program for North West REC members include:

- Minimum amount of \$500 to \$999 written for one
- Maximum amount of \$7,000 for equipment upgrade, written for three years.
- Maximum amount of \$4,000 for house improvement of insulation, doors, windows, caulking, weatherstripping, etc.
- 5.50% simple interest
- Monthly payments included on electric bill
- No penalty for early pay-off

North West REC will deduct any rebates from the total itemized bill and will finance up to 90% of the remainder upon approval from our board of directors.

MANAGER'S Report

COVID-19 UPDATE

Unprecedented is a word that is getting used a lot this year, but it certainly applies to what we are experiencing in 2020. I hope you and your family have stayed healthy and safe. I am pleased to report that the "NWREC family" is doing well and all of our employees and directors are healthy. It was good to open our offices on June 8 and to have some visits from our members again. We continue to follow social distancing guidelines and have received great cooperation and support from our members. Thank you!

While COVID-19 has caused us to change some of our procedures and how we operate, I am pleased to report that your North West REC (NWREC) is doing well. Even though kilowatt hour sales are lower this year, with some of our commercial and industrial load being scaled back due to the impacts of COVID-19 on their operations, operating margins through May are actually better than budget. We will provide more detail in the coming months, but I did want to let our members know that NWREC is doing well and continuing to focus on our mission of providing safe, affordable and reliable power for our members.

We understand there have been a lot of cancellations of activities and events, and we had to do that back in March and April with our Member District Meetings. At the time, we decided to make every effort to have some member engagement events this fall. Our hope is to still do that. As of this writing, we are still planning to have our four Member Appreciation Day events in late August and early September. The dates are listed on the front page of this newsletter. These events will be held outdoors, and we will make every effort to have these be socially distanced, safe, and fun events. We know that some members may not be comfortable attending, and we certainly understand this. Additional information will be provided in a direct mail piece that will go out to all members in August.

NORTH WEST REC RECOGNIZED WITH ECONOMIC IMPACT AWARD



One of NWREC's key economic development partners is the Iowa Area Development Group (IADG). IADG is the marketing and business development office for Iowa's member-owned rural electric cooperatives. Rand Fisher, President of IADG, attended our June board meeting and presented NWREC with an IADG Impact Award for community development.

A recent example of our community development was the project support we provided to the Sioux County Conservation Foundation for the new 12,000 sq. ft. Prairie Woods Nature Center located in Oak Grove Park near Hawarden. This facility offers meaningful outdoor connection and endless educational opportunities for everyone, from students to seniors. NWREC supported this project with a \$360,000 zero-interest loan provided from our Revolving Loan Fund (RLF). We are also the electric service provider for this beautiful new facility.

In presenting this award, Mr. Fisher commended NWREC for being an active supporter of this project and many other initiatives throughout our four-county service area. He went on to thank NWREC for providing essential financial and technical assistance that many times is a critical component in successfully securing projects that create jobs and support community vitality.

We currently operate a RLF that has grown to \$5.2 million. NWREC has been successful in receiving \$4.2 million in grant funds from the USDA REDLG program and has provided the balance in matching funds and interest earnings on the loans. Since 1995, NWREC has made 72 RLF loans totaling \$14.3 million, to community projects like the Nature Center project and for new and expanding businesses projects. The RLF is a great tool for NWREC to help improve the quality in our rural areas by contributing to long term improvement in the local economy.



N.E.T. BROADBAND UPDATE

During this time of COVID-19, the importance of having access to Internet service has increased, especially for students and individuals who work from home. We wanted to remind our members that we are involved in a partnership with Evertek to deliver high speed wireless Internet service. The areas where we have towers include Sheldon, Orange City, Hawarden, Craig, Le Mars, Kingsley, Merrill, Ida Grove and Holstein.

NATIONAL HISTORY DAY Rural Electrification

Five northwest Iowa middle school students are celebrating after winning top honors for their documentary on rural electrification at the 2020 National History Day® (NHD) national finals. The NHD awards ceremony was held online in June due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Each year, more than 500,000 middle and high school students around the world participate in the NHD program. Iowa sent 69 students to this year's national finals where they competed for top honors against nearly 3,000 other students from around the world.

Josie Jacobs, Addison Naslund, Ben Philips, Lainey Schuknecht and Hayden Wahlberg, students at Akron-Westfield Middle School in Plymouth County, Iowa, won first place in the junior group division for their 10-minute

documentary, "Rural Electrification: Breaking Barriers with the Flip of a Switch." Valorie Philips, Akron-Westfield Middle School instructor and NHD coach, along with parent mentors LeAnne Philips and Arica Schuknecht, provided ongoing guidance to the students during project development.

NIPCO and member distribution cooperative North West Rural Electric Cooperative assisted the students in their research, providing historical photos and interviews as well as resources such as the book "The Next Greatest Thing: 50 Years of Rural Electrification In America" (National Rural Electric Cooperative Association, 1984). North West REC CEO Lyle Korver spent additional time with the students answering their questions and leading a tour of the cooperative.

Student Ben Philips, who lives on North West REC lines, shares, "My family's farm was one of the last ones in Plymouth County to get electricity through the local REC before World War II started. In our research, we learned that if farms didn't get connected before the war, they had to wait several more years for electricity until the war was over and electrification work started again."

Ben's great aunts contributed to the retelling of the rural electrification story, adding a personal perspective to the work. In the students' documentary, Margaret Talbott and Wanda Philips speak of the physical and emotional impacts they felt when their lives, as young women responsible for carrying out many chores on the farm and in their homes, were made better through the introduction of electric service. The students' documentary opens with a quote from Wanda Philips: "A miracle is something that is resoundingly unusual and wonderful, and all of electricity was a miracle to me."

It wasn't learned until later that Wanda Philips' husband, Richard (Ben's great-uncle), served as a Director for Plymouth Electric Cooperative from 1972 until 1984. He

was also elected as the Plymouth Electric Cooperative Director Representative to the NIPCO Board of Directors from May of 1982 until December of 1984. Philips stepped away from cooperative leadership to take a seat on the Plymouth County Board of Supervisors. "Wanda didn't mention this at all in the interview this winter," said Ben's mother, LeAnne Philips. She only learned of this cooperative connection in a recent conversation with Wanda, when Wanda called to catch up with the family.

The National History Day in Iowa program has been coordinated by the State Historical Society of Iowa, a division of the Iowa Department of Cultural Affairs, since 1994. Students progress through achievement levels during the competition; however, this year's pandemic restrictions kept the students from showcasing their work in Des Moines and Washington, D.C.



National History Day is a non-profit education organization, which provides a yearlong academic enrichment program that challenges students to research, develop and present papers, exhibits, documentaries, websites and performances about historical topics related to a designated annual theme. This year's theme was "Breaking Barriers in History."

- \$1,050 Area Parks & Recreation Centers community development projects


